Byelaws

1. General

- 1.1. All activity on club premises must be in strict compliance with:-
 - 1.1.1. SA and Federal Firearms Acts
 - 1.1.2. The SAPOL Range Certificate
 - 1.1.3. The SAPOL Schedule of Conditions
 - 1.1.4. SARPA Constitution, Byelaws etc
 - 1.1.5. Pistol Australia Constitution, Byelaws etc
 - 1.1.6. Conditions of Club Indemnity Insurance
 - 1.1.7. EAPC Club Constitution
 - 1.1.8. EAPC Club Byelaws and Protocols
- 1.2. All members must hold an H Class Licence
- 1.3. All members must have completed SARPA training and be members of SARPA
- 1.4. Members, New Members and Visitors must sign the attendance register on each visit, whether shooting or not
- 1.5. Members must wear name badges when on club premises
- 1.6. Only the matches, and training therefore, as set out in the Schedule of Conditions, may be carried out on club premises
- 1.7. Only completed, scheduled matches are counted for licence renewal
- 1.8. No person adversely affected by drink, drugs or prescription medication may handle firearms, ammunition or enter the ranges
- 1.9. All members are responsible for their own safety and the safety of other members at all times
- 1.10. All safety infringements must be reported to the Range Officer immediately and notified to the committee as soon as possible
- 1.11. Members are responsible for the safety and security of their firearms and ammunition at all times
- 1.12. Firearms and ammunition may not be left unattended at any time
- 1.13. Eye and ear protection is mandatory on the ranges
- 1.14. The red flag must be raised on the pole on the A range building for any shooting to be allowed in the club



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- 1.15. The red flag must be raised on the gate at the side of A range for shooting to be allowed on AB ranges
- 1.16. The red flag must be raised on the pole at the end of CD range for shooting to be allowed on CD ranges
- 1.17. All warning signs present during SAPOL inspection must be in place for any shooting to be allowed in the club
- 1.18. All shooting should be carried out under the supervision of a designated range officer
- 1.19. All directions from the range officer must be followed
- 1.20. Firearms must point in a safe direction at all times
- 1.21. Firearms may only be uncased and handled on the range firing point or in the safe area
- 1.22. Firearms are to be in a closed case (not a holster) at all other times
- 1.23. An exception is firearms may be uncased and handled inside the clubhouse during scheduled training or collectors club events - no ammunition may be present
- 1.24. Holsters may only be used by members with a current SARPA holster accreditation card
- 1.25. No shooting is allowed on any range in the 30mins preceding match start times
- 1.26. Smoking is not allowed on the ranges or in the clubhouse
- 1.27. Mobile phones must be switched off while on the range
- 1.28. A speed limit of 25kph should be observed on the access road, and consideration given to other road users
- 1.29. Disturbance or annoyance to people outside the club should be avoided at all times
- 1.30. All fauna and flora is protected
- 1.31. Dogs must be on leads and under effective control at all times on club premises
- 1.32. Any damage to or breakdowns of the facilities and equipment must be notified to the committee as soon as possible.



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2. Visitors

- 2.1. Visitors wishing to shoot at the club must sign a the Visitors Declaration Form on each visit stating they have not had a licence suspended cancelled or are otherwise prohibited from possessing firearms.
- 2.2. The Visitors Declaration Form must be countersigned by a member to confirm photo ID has been sighted
- 2.3. Visitors must wear a 'Visitor' badge when on club premises
- 2.4. Visitors must be provided with a copy of the pamphlet and given adequate instruction before commencing shooting
- 2.5. Visitors and new members who do not hold a full Class H licence and SARPA training must be supervised by a member who has held a full Class H licence for a minimum of one year
- 2.6. Supervision is to be direct and immediate one-to-one supervision to ensure safety at all times
- 2.7. Supervisors may not carry out any other activity while supervising
- 2.8. Visitors are allowed a total of three shooting visits in any six-month period, excluding scheduled family days, after which they must apply for membership
- 2.9. Unless known personally to a club member there should be a minimum of one week between a visitor applying to visit the club and a visit involving the handling of firearms taking place. 'Walk-ins' are not permitted to handle firearms or ammunition.
- 2.10. People wishing to join the club should be directed in the first instance to contact the Club Secretary so the correct procedures (FASAT) can be followed
